

It is <u>essential</u> you provide your child with a cap or hat with a covering for the back of the neck and a pair of sunglasses. Please leave these items in their pouches in the classrooms - <u>clearly marked with their name</u>. Thank you!

May altar




Please encourage your child to bring in a few flowers for Our Lady's altar during the month of May.

Talking Tip

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|||| |||| Help your child develop good language and communication skills with this tip:

- * Help your child to use more words by adding to what they've said, eg if they said "ball" you might say, "Yes, a red ball".
- * If your child says something incorrectly, say it back the right way, eg "Goggy bited it", "Yes, the dog bit it, didn't he?".

You can help your child at home by ...

- 1) Involving your children in baking, rolling and cutting activities using smaller tools discussing how food <u>changes</u> when it is cooked.
- 2) Allowing your children to wash, dry and put some dishes away growing their awareness of how to organise a space, ie the cupboard.

















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
